CALL MEETING TO ORDER: Mayor Everhart called regular city council meeting to order at 7:00 PM

ROLL CALL: Clerk Ptak called roll, Heffington, Elliott, Adams, Secor in attendance.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE: Mayor Everhart led the pledge of allegiance.

A. APPROVAL OF MINUTES: JULY 26, 2023, JULY 27, 2023, & AUGUST 3, 2023. **ACTION ITEM**

Counselor Secor made a motion, seconded by Adams, to approve the minutes dated July 26, 2023. 3 ayes, Elliott abstain. Motion carried. Counselor Secor made a motion, seconded by Adams, to approve the minutes dated July 27, 2023 and August 3, 2023. 4 ayes. Motion carried.

B. IDAHO CITY EVENT CHECKLIST: **ACTION ITEM**

1. HARLEYS PUB PREPARTY FOR "PARTY AT THE PEN - OLD SKOOL BIKE RUN" SEPTEMBER 1, 2023

Kim Staneart informed council there would be 150-200 motorcycles coming to town Friday September 1st from all over the State. Saturday and Sunday they would be down in the valley for the actual bike show. Staneart requested the road be closed from 5pm to 11pm. Bikes would be arriving around 5:30 and leaving by 10pm. There will also be a band playing that will be done by 10pm. Staneart also requested to leave the gates at Harley's open to allow people to wander in and out. She will have security on site and wristbands for alcohol. Counselor Secor made a motion, seconded by Elliott, to approve the event checklist for Harleys Pub Preparty for Party At The Pen - Old Skool Bike Run September 1, 2023. 4 ayes. Motion carried. Counselor Secor made a motion, seconded by Elliott, to approve an alcohol variance September 1st from 5pm to 11pm from Commercial St. to Walulla within the barricades. 4 ayes. Motion carried.

Counselor Secor made a motion, seconded by Adams, to approve the bills July 27, 2023 through August 9, 2023 in the amount of \$11,132.09. 4 ayes. Motion carried.

A. REVISION TO LIQUOR LICENSE ORDINANCE

City Attorney Callahan informed council that in working on the ordinance it needed more work and is not ready at this time. Callahan will have the ordinance ready for council at the next meeting. It will get rid of all the items that are not enforceable,

incorporate all of the things that can be enforced, and clean up some other language. A survey was done of about 10 other cities liquor license ordinances to ensure the city's ordinance lined up with other cities of the same size.

A. VALIDATION/VACATION OF PUBLIC STREETS AND PUBLIC RIGHTS OF WAY WITH BOISE COUNTY. ACTION ITEM

City Attorney Callahan informed council this carried over from the last couple of meetings discussing Myers Street, public access, and public use. Since that time there have been a few other streets identified that are not in the road book the County keeps that are platted. The process to ensure everything is cleaned up and recorded is to petition the County to do a validation and vacation of the public streets and public rights of way. A surveyor has been engaged to survey the streets in question. Once the County takes up the petition there will be a hearing to consider whether the streets have been established as public rights of way and public streets. Counselor Elliott made a motion, seconded by Heffington, to file a petition for validation and vacation of non-recorded public streets and public right of ways with Boise County. 4 ayes. Motion carried.

B. LETTER OF INTENT FROM CAROL KIRKLAND – IDAHO CITY HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION. ACTION ITEM

Counselor Secor questioned how many commissioners need to reside within the city limits and how many can be outside the city limits. City Attorney Callahan responded that the city code does not have residency requirements. Counselor Secor made a motion, seconded by Elliott, to appoint Carol Kirkland to the Idaho City Historic Preservation Commission. 4 ayes. Motion carried.

C. LETTER OF INTENT FROM RHONDA JAMESON – IDAHO CITY HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION. ACTION ITEM

Counselor Secor made a motion, seconded by Elliott, to appoint Rhonda Jameson to the Idaho City Historic Preservation Commission. 4 ayes. Motion carried.

D. NOISE VARIANCE FOR THE GOLD MINE SALOON AUGUST 25 & 26, 2023 TILL 1AM. ACTION ITEM

Mayor Everhart explained that this has been granted in past years for the same time frame and same event. Counselor Adams added that the Goldmine's music lately has been extremely loud, and she has received multiple complaints about it. Adams requested that the Goldmine lower the volume during these events.

Rose Adams addressed council and asked if the city has a noise ordinance. Mayor Everhart responded yes, up until 11pm. Adams explained that she lives on Bear Run and she can hear the music there. Adams read from a document that Boise and Meridian have regarding noise and suggested that maybe some of the language should be added to Idaho City's ordinance. Adams further expressed that she does not look forward to listening to the loud music until 1AM.

Shauna Asher explained that she lives behind Trudy's and the music is so loud normally and she cannot imagine listening to it until 1AM. Asher is also concerned about the Goldmine controlling their crowds and providing the needed security so that there are not any issues.

Carrie Anne Kowalczyk addressed council and thanked them for the work on Montgomery and changing the time of council meetings. Kowalczyk added that she did not see why the Goldmine could not move the music inside after 11pm. Kowalczyk further explained that when the Goldmine first began doing the music it could barely be heard and this last weekend was clearly audible.

Steve Ellis, Goldmine owner addressed council and the citizens present and explained the requested variance is taking place the same weekend as the Jack Pine Roundup which could potentially bring a couple thousand people to town. After the rodeo is typically one of the Goldmine's biggest days during the last 5 years and this event is the same as what has been done in the past. Ellis explained that he is happy to work on lowering the sound. There will potentially be a couple hundred people at the Goldmine, and it is not feasible to do things inside. Mayor Everhart explained that the citizens have a valid point and questioned if Ellis has discussed having additional security measures. Ellis explained that anytime they have events like this they have local security come in. Mayor Everhart also questioned the loudness of the music and explained there are homes close by. Ellis responded that he would be happy to work on the noise level.

Counselor Elliott questioned if there was a way to enforce a noise variance but toned down. Counselor Adams explained that Boise, Meridian, Nampa, and Garden City have noise ordinances that have a decibel limits or a specific distance. Mayor Everhart added that currently Idaho City does not have a decibel limit, but that may be something that needs to be added in the future. Discussion on the noise and what could be done ensued.

Bobby Mathews addressed Ellis and explained that people are informed to call if there is an issue but nobody at the Goldmine answers the phone. Mathews further explained that last Saturday his sick mother could not get to sleep with the air conditioner and a fan running due to the noise level. Mathews added that he runs a responsible business and all he wants is the other Goldmine owner to run the business responsibly. Mathews then questioned the noise ordinance and what time it says the noise will stop. If it says 11pm then it should stop at 11pm. Discussion on what time the music stopped last weekend ensued. Teishia Mathews explained that they would not have a hard time accepting things if the Goldmine consistently shut things down at 11pm, but they have not. Teishia added that they have been having these issues for years. Mayor Everhart explained that they have already addressed the owners of the Goldmine and they have agreed to stop the music at 10:55 to alleviate this issue.

Brenda Secor questioned the amount of people potentially coming to the Goldmine after the Rodeo and the number of Idaho City Police Officers, which could be a potential issue.

Roy Fields added that he lives on Lodgepole Ln. and can hear the noise.

Mayor Everhart and council agreed to table the Variance until the next meeting. Kowalczyk added that it would be nice if the Goldmine would verify the number of security they will provide. Ellis responded that everyone on his staff will be on and 2-3 for security. Discussion on staff and security ensued. Mayor Everhart requested for the next meeting Ellis provide a plan as far as what the decibel levels could be and detail on their security plans. Counselor Heffington asked if Ellis would personally be present for the event and Ellis responded yes. Discussion on the event and plans ensued.

Public works will be working on Bear Run Thursday to compact the new material that was added.

Chief Otter informed council that the weekends have been pretty quiet legally. Otter did hear the music was pretty loud. The County was pretty busy so that is where he was helping out.

Clerk Ptak informed council there are adjustments that need to be signed off on. Ptak added that she sent the Mayor and council an email regarding the hazard mitigation plan online course that is coming up. Discussion on the course ensued.

City Attorney Callahan informed council she is working on a mutual aid agreement with the County for the Mayor and Chief to look over. Once they go over it and make any changes it will then be negotiated with the County and then come back for Council to approval.

Secor no update. Adams did a ride along with Watson and plans to do one with Chief Otter as well. Elliott no update, Heffington no update.

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Rose Adams added that extending the time for the Goldmine until 1am could have people drunk and driving down the highway which could affect people that live along the highway.

Sauna Asher explained that she invited Steve Ellis to her backyard this weekend during the music so that he can get an idea of how loud it is.

(10) (a) Except for fees that are authorized or prescribed under other provisions of Idaho law, no fee shall be charged for the first two (2) hours of labor in responding to a request for public records, or for copying the first one hundred (100) pages of paper records that are requested. For responses that exceed the above, the following fees shall apply:

COPYING FEES

Black .10 per page

Color .50 per page

Copies of City information or data held in any, but written form will be calculated as to the direct costs incurred in copying such information or data.

NFS FEES FOR 2024

1. Returned checks shall be subject to a charge of \$26.25.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE LICENSE FEES FOR 2024

WHEREAS, Idaho City Ordinance No. 260 provides that license fees for the sale of alcoholic beverages be set by resolution of the City Council each year.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED by the Mayor and City Council as follows:

1. Beer to be consumed on premises: The 2024 license fee for retail sale of beer to be consumed on the premises where sold shall be \$150.00
2. Beer not to be consumed on premises: The 2024 license fee for retail sale of beer, none of which is to be consumed on the premises where sold, shall be \$75.00.
3. Wine to be consumed on premises: The 2024 license fee for retail sale of wine to be consumed on the premises where sold shall be \$150.00.
4. Wine not to be consumed on premises: The 2024 license fee for retail sale of wine, none of which is to be consumed on the premises where sold, shall be \$75.00.
5. Liquor: The 2024 license fee for retail sale of liquor by the drink shall be \$400.00.
6. License name transfer \$25.00.

An additional event license fee may be required for carnivals, public entertainment, or sponsored events in an amount approved by the City Council as meeting the City's expenses related to the activity, including but not limited to the provision of public works and police.

A permittee for a carnival, public entertainment, or sponsored event shall establish financial responsibility in the form of an insurance policy issued jointly to the owner and the City of Idaho City in the minimum amount of one million dollars, single limit.

CEMETERY FEES FOR 2024

WHEREAS, Idaho City Ordinance No. 356 provides that cemetery fees be set by resolution of the City Council.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED by the Mayor and City Council as follows:

The Council can waive a portion of the fee or set a monthly use fee for groups desiring to use the Hall on a set schedule for a class or multi-day event.

DOG AND LIVESTOCK LICENSE FEES FOR 2024

WHEREAS, the City of Idaho City has adopted a Regulation of Dogs and Livestock Ordinance; and WHEREAS, the Regulation Ordinance provides for the setting of fees for Dog Licenses, Kennel Licenses and Seizure/Boarding/Disposal fees by resolution of the City Council.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED by the Mayor and City Council as follows:

1. Fees for dog licenses shall be \$11.00 for spayed or neutered dogs and \$27.50 for dogs that have not been spayed or neutered. If a renewal license is not purchased by January 31, 2023, the cost of the license shall be \$22.00 for spayed or neutered dogs and \$55.00 for dogs that have not been spayed or neutered.
2. Fee for replacement tag shall be \$5.25 per tag.
3. Fees for kennel licenses shall be \$66.00.
4. Fees for seizure of a dog at large shall be \$82.50.
5. Disposal fees shall be actual costs incurred.

EVENT CHECKLIST APPLICATION FEE SCHEDULE 2024

1. Event Checklist Applications shall be subject to a filing fee
 - a. \$52.50 for profit organizations

IDAHO CITY POLICE DEPARTMENT SERVICE RATES FOR 2024

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that there is a need to adopt a schedule of charges for providing police protection and other emergency services by the Idaho City Police Department to promote the welfare of the citizens of Idaho City; and the establishment of such charges, not to exceed those approved by the Idaho Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED by the Mayor and the City Council that service rates are set as follows:

1. A fee for council approved events will be set at \$25.00 an hour per officer to cover additional coverage of law enforcement.
2. The number of hours for events will be determined by the Idaho City Chief of Police.
3. A fee for council approved events that are held after hours (between dusk to dawn) shall be \$37.50 an hour per officer and determined by the Chief of Police.

PARKING VIOLATION FINE FOR 2024

WHEREAS, Idaho City Code 6-1-5 provides that the City Council shall establish a schedule of fines for parking violations by Resolution, the fine for violation of any parking restriction set forth in Chapter 1, Title 6 of the Idaho City Code shall be \$52.50. Imposition of such fine shall not affect or limit the power of the City to impound or remove vehicles pursuant to the provisions of Idaho City Code 6-1-1-E, 6-1-8, or other provision of law.

RODEO ARENA & AMPHITHEATRE FEE SCHEDULE (FORMERLY KNOWN AS PARKS AND RECREATION) FOR 2024

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF IDAHO CITY, IDAHO, RESERVING THE FORGONE AMOUNT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023 FOR POTENTIAL USE IN SUBSEQUENT YEARS AS DESCRIBED IN IDAHO CODE §63-802, et al.

WHEREAS, Idaho Code §50-235 empowers the city council of each city to levy taxes for general revenue purposes; and,

WHEREAS, Idaho Code §50-1002 requires the city council of each city in the State of Idaho to pass a budget, referred to as an annual appropriation ordinance; and,

WHEREAS, Idaho Code §63-802 sets limitations on all taxing district budget requests on the amount of property tax revenues that can be used to fund programs and services; and,

WHEREAS, Idaho Code §63-802(1)(a) allows each taxing entity to increase property tax budget amounts by a maximum of 3%, plus an amount calculated based on the value of both new construction and annexation added during the previous calendar year, plus an amount for forgone taxes; and,

WHEREAS, Idaho Code §63-802(1)(f) requires that the City adopt an annual resolution to reserve additional forgone amount in order to utilize that amount in subsequent years; and,

WHEREAS, the City has met the notice and hearing requirements in Idaho Code §63-802(1)(f) to reserve the current year's increase in the forgone amount; and,

WHEREAS, the City intends to reserve \$20 . 00 of its current year's increase in allowable forgone amount.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF IDAHO CITY, IDAHO, that \$20 . 00 of the current year's allowable increase in its forgone amount is reserved and included in the City's total forgone balance for potential use in subsequent years.

ORDINANCE NO. 316

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF IDAHO CITY, BOISE COUNTY, IDAHO, REPEALING TITLE 5, CHAPTER 6 OF THE CITY CODE AND REPLACING IT WITH A NEW TITLE 5, CHAPTER 6, OF THE CITY CODE, REGULATING THE CREATION OF NOISE WITHIN THE CITY, AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, The City Council has determined that the generation of noise within the city limits should be regulated in order to protect the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Idaho City and visitors to Idaho City,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF IDAHO CITY, IDAHO:

That Title 5, Chapter 6 of the Idaho City Code is hereby repealed and shall be replaced with a new Title 5, Chapter 6 to be enacted as follows:

5-6-1: PURPOSE:

The purpose of this article is the protection of the health, safety, and welfare of the residents of the city. It is determined that sound can and does constitute a hazard to the health, safety, welfare, and quality of life of residents of the city. The mayor and council, by way of Idaho Code section 50-308 are empowered to impose reasonable limitations and regulations upon the production of sound to reduce the harmful effect thereof. Now, therefore, it is hereafter the policy of this city to prevent and regulate sound generated by loud amplification devices wherever it is deemed to be harmful to the health, safety, welfare, or quality of life of the residents of the city, and this article shall be liberally construed to effectuate that purpose.

5-6-2: DEFINITIONS:

For the purpose of this article, the following definitions shall apply:

LOUD AMPLIFICATION DEVICE: Any equipment designed or used for sound production, reproduction, or amplification, including, but not limited to, any radio, television, phonograph, musical instrument, stereo, tape player, compact disc player, loudspeaker, public address (PA) system, sound amplifier, or comparable sound broadcasting device.

PERSON: Any individual, association, organization, or entity having legally recognized existence, whether public or private.

PLACE OF RESIDENCE: Any building or portion thereof adapted or used and intended for the overnight accommodation of persons. In the event the building is used for

multiple individual units (i.e., apartment, condominium, hotel, motel, duplex, triplex, etc.), each individual unit shall be considered a separate residence for the purpose of this article.

PLAINLY AUDIBLE: Sound for which the information content is clearly communicated to the listener, including, but not limited to, understandable spoken speech, comprehension of whether a voice is raised or normal, comprehensible musical rhythms, melody, or instrumentation, and the source of which is identifiable to the listener.

5-6-3: PUBLIC NOISE PROHIBITED:

Between the hours of eleven o'clock (11:00) P.M. one day and seven o'clock (7:00) A.M. the next day, it shall be unlawful for any person, or business to make, cause, or allow loud or offensive noise by means of voice, musical instrument, horn, radio, loudspeaker, automobile, machinery, other sound amplifying equipment, or any other means which disturbs the peace, quiet, and comfort of any reasonable person of normal sensitiveness residing in the area. "Loud or offensive noise" is that which is plainly audible within any place of residence, business, or restaurants other than the source of the sound, or upon a public right of way or street at a distance of one hundred feet (100') or more from the source of such sound.

5-6-4: LOUD AMPLIFICATION DEVICES UPON OR WITHIN MOTOR VEHICLES PROHIBITED:

It shall be unlawful for any person to operate or permit the operation of any loud amplification device upon or within a motor vehicle in such a manner that the sound therefrom is plainly audible upon a public right of way or street at a distance of fifty feet (50') or more from the source of the sound.

5-6-5: EXCEPTIONS:

The following sounds are exempted from the provisions of this article:

- (1) Sounds caused by an emergency vehicle or personnel when responding to an emergency call or acting in time of emergency.
- (2) Sounds caused by activities upon any municipal, school, religious, or publicly owned property or facility provided that such activities have been authorized by the owner of such property or facility or its agent.
- (3) Sounds caused by parades, fireworks displays, or any other event for which a permit for the activity is required and has been obtained from the authorized governmental entity within such hours as may be imposed as a condition for the issuance of said permit.
- (4) Sounds caused by burglar alarms that are not in violation of this code.

(5) Sounds caused by safety warning devices required by law.

5-6-6: PENALTY:


A violation of any provision of this article shall be a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to penalty as provided in Section 1-4-1 of this code.

5-6-7: EFFECTIVE DATE:

That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon passage, approval and publication according to law.

NOISE Ordinance

PURPOSE

The purpose of this Ordinance is to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of Idaho City. It is determined that sound can and does constitute a hazard to the health, safety, welfare, and quality of life of city residents. The Mayor and Council, by way of Idaho Code Section 50-308, are empowered to impose reasonable limitations and regulations upon the production of sound to reduce the harmful effects thereof. Now, therefore, it is hereafter the policy of this city to prevent and regulate sound generated by loud amplification devices wherever it is deemed to be harmful to the health, safety, welfare, or quality of life of the citizens of the city, and this Ordinance shall be liberally construed to effectuate that purpose.

Section DEFINITIONS

For the purposes of this Ordinance, the following definitions shall apply:

CITY:

Idaho City, Idaho, or the area within the city limits of Idaho City, Idaho.

COMMON AREA(S):

The area(s) of a facility, complex, apartment unit, hotel, motel or the like that are open either to the general public or persons with the permission of the owner or agent of the owner of the area. This definition would include but not be limited to the following: swimming pools, restaurants, patios, hot tubs, saunas, laundry rooms, meeting rooms, lobbies, lounges, bars and other areas within the facility that are either constructed or designed for use in this manner.

EMERGENCY:

Any occurrence or set of circumstances involving actual or imminent physical trauma or property damage demanding immediate attention.

EMERGENCY VEHICLE:

A motor vehicle belonging to a fire department, fire-fighting association, or fire district, an ambulance, or a motor vehicle belonging to a federal, state, county, or municipal law enforcement agency.

LOUD AMPLIFICATION DEVICE:

Any equipment designed or used for sound production, reproduction, or amplification, including, but not limited to any radio, television, phonograph, musical instrument, stereo, tape player, compact disc player, loudspeaker, public address (P.A.) system, sound amplifier, or comparable sound broadcasting device.

PERSON:

Any individual, association, organization, or entity having a legally recognized existence, whether public or private.

PLACE OF RESIDENCE:

Any building or portion thereof adapted or used and intended for the overnight accommodation of persons. In the event the building is used for multiple individual units (i.e., apartment,

condominium, hotel, motel, duplex, triplex, etc.) each individual unit shall be considered a separate residence for the purposes of this ordinance.

PLAINLY AUDIBLE:

Sound for which the information content is clearly communicated to the listener, including, but not limited to understandable spoken speech, comprehension of whether a voice is raised or normal, comprehensible musical rhythms, melody, or instrumentation, and the source of which is identifiable to the listener.

Section NOISE PROHIBITIONS

1. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate or permit the operation of any loud amplification device in such a manner that the sound therefrom:
 - A. Exhausts. The discharge into the open air of the exhaust of any steam engine, stationary internal combustion engine, motorboat, or motor vehicle except through a muffler or other device which will effectively prevent loud or explosive noises therefrom.
 - B. Noisy animals. The keeping of any animal or bird which by causing frequent or long continued noise shall disturb the comfort or repose of any persons in the vicinity.
 - C. Plainly audible loud or offensive noise that exceeds fifty (50) decibels at the closest property line, or,
 - D. Plainly audible upon a public right-of-way or street at a distance of one hundred (100) feet or more from the source of such sound, or,
 - E. Plainly audible within any place of residence not the source of the sound.
 - F. Use of drums or other instruments to attract attention. The use of any drum or other instrument or device for the purpose of attracting attention by the creation of noise to any performance, show, or sale.
 - G. Use of loudspeakers or amplifiers for advertising. The use, operating, or permitting to be played, used, or operated of any radio receiving set, musical instrument, phonograph, loudspeaker, sound amplifier, or other machine or device for the producing or reproducing of sound.
 - H. Yelling, shouting, etc. Yelling, shouting, hooting, whistling, or singing on the public streets, or at any time or place so as to annoy or disturb the quiet, comfort, or repose of persons in any office or in any dwelling, hotel, or other type of residence, or of any persons in the vicinity.
2. Loud Amplification Devices Upon Or Within Motor Vehicles: It shall be unlawful for any person to operate or permit the operation of any loud amplification device upon or within a motor vehicle in such a manner that the sound therefrom is plainly audible upon a public right of way or street at a distance of fifty feet (50') or more from the source of the sound.

3. Between the hours of ten o'clock (10:00) P.M. one day and eight o'clock (8:00) A.M. the next day, it shall be unlawful for any person or business to make or cause loud or offensive noise by means of voice, musical instrument, horn, radio, loudspeaker, automobile, machinery, vibrating compaction equipment, vehicles with backup beepers engaged in reverse or moving in a reverse direction except for any vehicle being used for emergency purposes. other sound amplifying equipment, or any other means which disturbs the peace, quiet, and comfort of any reasonable person of normal sensitiveness residing in the area.

Section ENFORCEMENT

- A. Peace officer citation: Any Idaho City peace officer or person empowered to enforce this provision of the Idaho City Code is authorized to issue a uniform citation upon his own observation of a violation without the necessity of a citizen complainant's signature on said citation. By signing the citation officer or person is certifying that he has reasonable grounds to believe that the person cited committed the offense contrary to law.
- B. Citizen citation: A uniform citation may also be signed by any citizen or person in whose presence an alleged violation of this Ordinance occurred and be witnessed by an Idaho City peace officer or person empowered to enforce this provision of the Idaho City Code whose name shall be endorsed on the citation.

Section ORDINANCE ADDITIONAL TO OTHER LAW

The provisions of this Ordinance shall be cumulative and nonexclusive and shall not affect any other claim, cause of action, or remedy; nor, unless specifically provided, shall it be deemed to repeal, amend, or modify any law, ordinance, or regulation relating to noise or sound, but shall be deemed additional to existing legislation and common law on such subject.

Section EXEMPTIONS

The following sounds are exempted from the provisions of this Ordinance:

- A. Airplanes and other FAA-regulated aircraft.
- B. City-hosted events shall conclude no later than midnight.
- C. Sounds caused by any emergency vehicle or personnel when responding to an emergency call or acting in time of emergency.
- D. Sounds caused by burglar alarms that are not in violation of Idaho City Code.
- E. Sounds caused by parades, fireworks display, or any other event for which a permit for that type of activity is required and has been obtained from the authorized governmental entity within such hours as may be imposed as a condition for the issuance of said permit.
- F. Sounds caused by safety warning devices required by law.

TEMPORARY WAIVERS:

A. A person or entity may apply to the City Council for a temporary waiver from the provisions of this chapter.

B. The noise waiver (for time only) may be extended no later than **midnight**. Such applications shall be submitted to the City Clerk's Office at least thirty (30) days in advance of the date of the activity or event seeking the waiver.

Section PENALTY

Any person who shall violate any of the terms or provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine of **_____dollars** excluding court costs and fees. There is no right to a trial by jury of a citation or complaint for an infraction and such trials shall be held before the court without a jury.

Effective Date

That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon passage, approval and publication according to law

Temporary Noise Ordinance Application

I acknowledge that this permit relates only to the noise ordinance, and I may need additional permits for other uses conducted on the property during the event or activity.*



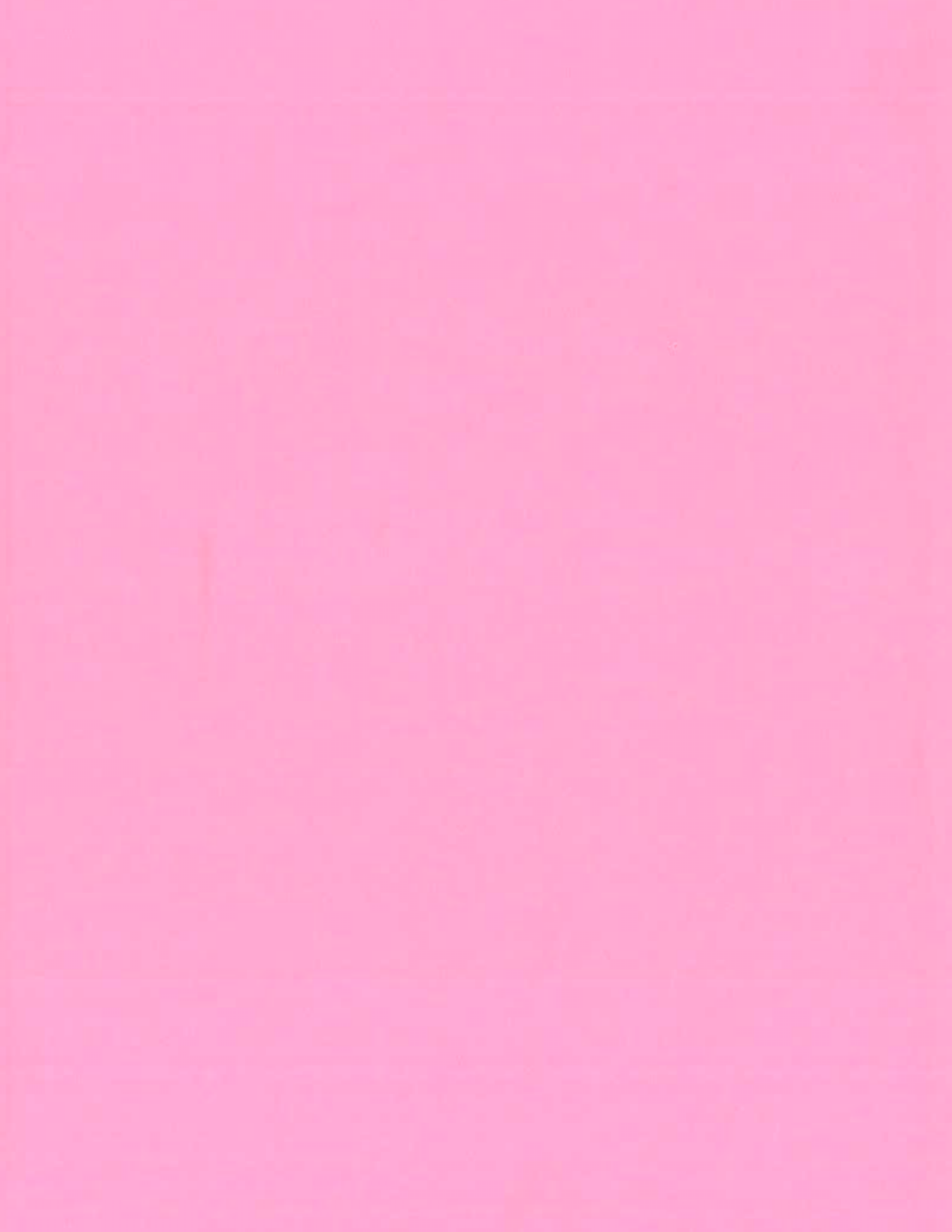

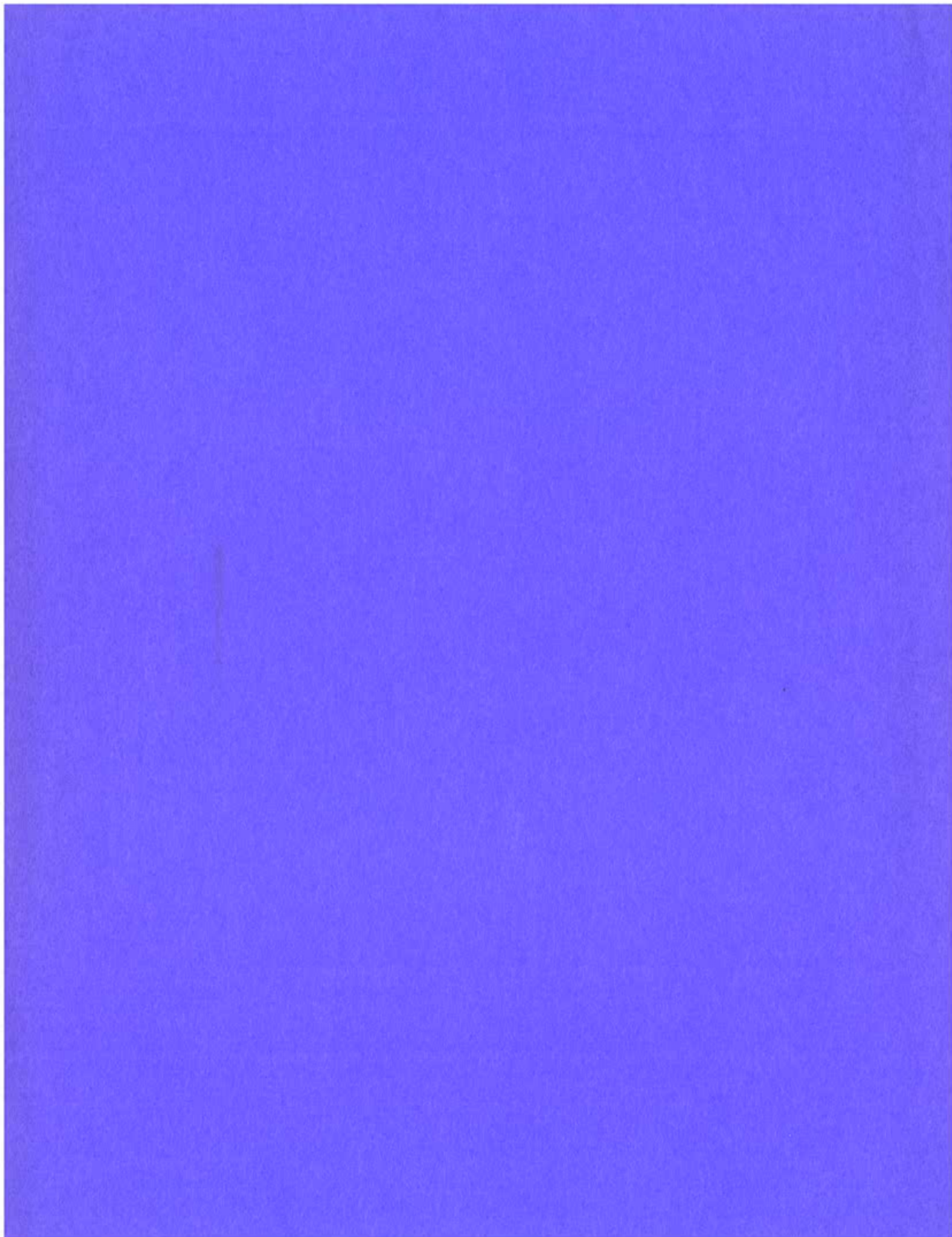
